OWA receives funding from a number of organisations and plays a vital role in Waikouaiti/Karitane/Hawksbury communities by offering events, services and information, including the POWA Community News that you are now reading. The purpose of POWA is to foster community engagement which means bringing people together, and we do this by collaborating with local clubs and

groups and organising a range of diverse activities. By taking part, community members (and the POWA Team) are provided with opportunities for personal growth and skill-building. If you've attended one of our recent huis, you'll have gained some useful information that you can put into practice. You might have discussed the hui with whanau and were stimulated to research and develop your ideas further so that you can make informed decisions. But just as important, you might have caught up with someone you haven't seen for a while and renewed a friendship or support network. These intangible results of our efforts are often the most valuable.

We try to respond to the evolving needs and aspirations of our community. We're becoming more involved in environmental efforts, conservation, sustainability, resilience and we support local organisations and local businesses (and appreciate support from them).

Some of our activities since last August include: Publishing and delivering 11 editions of the POWA Community News, managing a Facebook page (647 followers) and the Waikouaiti Website. We operate the Foodbank (providing 51 parcels this year). We have expanded the Community Garden. We ran the POWA Fete along with the Garden Club's Spring Show last September and in conjunction with the Kati Huirapa Runaka ki Puketuraki we held a free Community Luncheon attended by around 80 people. Our Christmas themed High Tea in November was attended by over 60 people. It became a family affair with spot prizes and Santa in attendance.

Notable achievements include the renovation and installation of a flagpole as a directional signpost, near the

Community Gardens. And, you will have noticed CAKE WINNERS: our new mural in the Main Street. A sub-group researched the work of street artists, sources of funding and negotiated with the many groups involved. We appreciated the way the community and local organisations helped to WAIHEMO WASTEBUSTERS fund it. Our June Community Resilience Hui was attended by around 120 people and we're in the process of planning two more huis.

From the dunes, a pair of black oyster-catchers march, red beaks plunging purposefully into the shallows, then disappear among the glistening rocks.



Waikouaiti locals Kirsty Malloch and Winnie Tang, did their dojo and community proud at the recent Mas Oyama Kyokushin Karate National Championships in Christchurch. Kirsty a previous National title holder (2014) regained her title in the women's light weight division. Winnie in her first assay into knock down fighting put in two excellent performances despite giving away more than a third of her bodyweight to both opponents.

hat's involved in making it to the mat? Preparations started 10 weeks prior with Kirsty and Winnie accepting the challenge. If you think the fights themselves - 3 minutes, bare knuckle full contact fighting with the possibility of two 2-minute extensions - sounds daunting, then the road to get there will put you right off. Ten weeks of intense bruising preparations are a genuine game changer. Their Sensei (instructor) commented: "At the start of the 12 weeks I could get away with playing. By the end of the ten weeks I had to work to keep up and I'm 35kg heavier than Kirsty and more like 50kg heavier than Winnie!"

At the competition, Kirsty faced off against North Island fighter Emily Dawson. One minute into the first round Kirsty scored her first half point with a kick to the inside thigh stopping Emily in her tracks. When the action continued Kirsty targeted the same leg, scoring a second time, Kirsty took her first victory.

Winnie was up against Becky Dack an Auckland black belt, last year's division winner. She had a five-inch height and 15kg weight advantage so it was an uphill battle for Winnie. If Becky was expecting a quick knock out finish it was denied, with the first round going the full three minutes and judges calling for an extension. In the round two, despite being tired, both fighters kept dishing it out but in the final seconds a nicely placed head kick from Becky left Winnie briefly stunned giving a half point advantage to Becky. A points advantage and the judges declared a victory for Becky Dack.

The Womens Final was between Becky Dack and Kirsty Maloch. Kirsty's approach was clinical, targeting the legs



from the outset to reduce the danger from Becky's quite exceptional head kicks, a plan that worked. They both closed the round on their feet and fighting hard. During the second round, both fighters gave their full repertoire, but fatigue set in so there wasn't a clear winner at the end of the round. Any fighter will tell you that entering the second extension becomes a battle of wills in that final round. To the audience's delight, both fighters came out energised in the 3rd round, staking their respective claim on the title. It was a tough decision for the four judges as it was a close contest. However, 1 minute 45 seconds into the final round Kirsty landed a heavy round kick to the body downing her opponent for a TKO victory.

A great day out for the Karitane team with plenty to celebrate. Kirsty brought home the Womens Light Weight title and Winnie proved that lethality and indominable spirit can come in small packages.


Welcomes children and their families/whanau from zero to six years for education and care.

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Two ACT party ministers visited us during July. Mark Cameron is the spokesperson for Rural Communities (amongst a range of other responsibilities) and Todd Stephenson is the spokesperson for Arts, Culture and Heritage. We were pleased that Sophie Barker (and her daughter Charlotte) joined us. Sophie is a DCC councillor with a range of responsibilities who has taken an interest in our activities which we appreciate. Our visitors enjoyed a tour through the old bank building and were impressed with our 3-year-old purpose-built heritage facility. We outlined the process we went through to reach this goal and our continuing plans for restoration of the old bank building. Lagoon Creature of the Month:

Water flea Daphnia carinata

This is considered a native species of water flea but also occurs widely throughout the world. They are found at the lagoon. There are many different species of water fleas but only a few found in Aotearoa/NZ, with D. carinata being the most numerous. These tiny crustaceans, they are about 5mm long, are visible to the naked eye. Their bodies are



covered by a transparent 'shell' which makes them rather interesting to view under magnification. It is possible to see their heart beating or their young present in the brood pouch. D. carinata are called fleas because they swim in a jerky fashion reminiscent of flea movements. They wiggle their antennae to propel them through water. Unlike their land-based namesakes they do not bite. D. carinata live in still fresh water, anything from lakes down to water troughs. They feed by filtering plankton out water.

D. carinata usually breed asexually producing a brood every time they moult. The eggs hatch after about 24 hours in the brood pouch and then are released into the water after about 3 days. These instars go through several moults before reaching maturity. Occasionally males will be produced enabling D. carinata to reproduce bi sexually.

These little crustaceans are an important food source for small fishes and other insects. They are also sold commercially as aquarium fish food and even have their own Facebook site.

Hawksbury Lagoon

The report of the investigation of the old Inverary Street tip site and risk to human and wildlife has been completed by e3Scientific, a South Island ecological management company contracted by the Department of Conservation (DOC). It is an impressively thorough and lengthy report relying on test pits dug at different sites, visual assessment of the lagoon bank, municipal documents and correspondence (including some from the Karitane/ Waikouaiti Beautifying Society objecting to the tip site), aerial photographs of the site from 1947 until 2022, and historical mapping and documentation of the lagoon. Prior to the tip site being established the lagoon edge was close to Inverary Street. Landfilling started along the lagoon edge moving out to the into the lagoon from about 1958 until mid 1970's. An estimated 27,000 m3 of household refuse and capping material is contained from the area just below the railway line down to the Inverary Street bridge.

This area is larger than expected and that documented as a HAIL site by the Otago Regional Council (who will be requested to update their records). As about 50 years have passed since the tip was closed, breakdown of organic matter will be complete meaning that hazards from leachate and gases will be past but risks associated with any dumped metals, polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons and asbestos will remain with dust being the main risk to people. A concern is that the depth of capping material varies over the site with the thinnest cover being near the entrance to the lagoon causeway path. Although there are frequent episodes of turf being dug up by the late night joyriders, to date no rubbish has been visible. The erosion of the tip site bank through wave action is concerning. The report recommends that an engineer qualified in coastal erosion will assess the bank when lagoon water levels are sufficiently low, that a site management plan is developed, and DOC together with the Dunedin City Council are to manage the site in the future as the area extends beyond the DOC site. DOC are following through by looking to engage a coastal erosion specialist.

Hikaroroa/Mt Watkins Conservation Group

During July, the group hosted two community huis, at the Events Centre and at the Puketeraki Marae. Speakers discussed the history and the cultural significance of Hikaroroa/Mt Watkins and the ecological values of the wider Hikaroroa area. This unique 660ha scenic reserve in the north branch catchment of the Waikouaiti River is right on our doorstep. A biodiversity hot spot for the region, it contains the best remaining examples of the forest types that covered coastal Otago hill before European settlement. Speakers discussed the community conservation group's involvement including planting and pest detection. More volunteers are needed for a variety of roles, so if you are passionate about conservation, you are invited to find out more and join the team.

Once you've filled it in and sent it off (post paid!), within 24 hours of receiving it, it is put into the computer system and referred to the appropriate Dept. This Dept HAS to reply back to you within 7 days with an answer – not necessarily an instant solution but definitely an explanation as to when it will be fixed OR why it can't be fixed at the time OR even maybe not at all. The point is DCC won't know about a problem IF NO-ONE TELLS THEM! You can. get Fix-o-Grams from Karitane Store, Library, my office, Pricecutter or ph. DCC 477 400.

Having trouble deciding which bin to put out?

The new, free DCC Kerbside Collection app went live in June 2024, replacing the previous app. It shows you what to sort into each of the four DCC kerbside bins. Plus, the app can give you collection day reminders, kerbside news such as snow day delays or any changes to collection days. Use it to tell the DCC if your bin hasn't been collected, if one of your bins has gone missing or needs repair, and more.

The new DCC Kerbside Collection app is available free from Google Play or the App Store.
